Message from the Mayor



The world has faced unprecedented disruption in 2020 and heartbreaking loss. I look forward to turning the page on this most difficult year and truly hope for a healthy and happy 2021. Let me begin by offering my sincerest condolences to all those who have lost a loved one, whether because of the COVID-19 pandemic or for another reason. Let me also send my message of hope to everyone, especially those who have suffered economic hardship and emotional stress due to the disruptions caused by the pandemic.

Even those who haven't suffered a personal loss, and still have a job are facing their own ordeal. They are worried about their elderly parents, or their kids. They may be worried about their own health. If they are living alone, they are facing greater loneliness because of the disruption to their regular social interactions, like playing cards with friends or taking a painting class at the Aquatic and Community Centre, or ACC.

Since the start of the pandemic in March, we have tried to help reduce the spread of the novel coronavirus by legislating mandatory masks in advance of the province, as well as hand sanitizer dispensers at apartments and condos. We helped seniors to have access to groceries by partnering with groups who helped make deliveries. We expanded our Daily Hello program, so that people could have daily contact by phone with a caring staff member. We launched a live outdoor music concert series to brighten the spirits of people living in seniors residences. We launched a daily call-to-listen service so residents could hear lectures using their home telephone from their favourite library speakers. When it was safe to do so, we partially re-opened the public library and ACC, offered summer-time park activities for kids, launched a drive-in movie program, and many more are in the planning.

We were inspired by the good deeds done across the city by regular people helping friends and neighbours. So many of you volunteered. So many religious institutions launched programs to help their members in their time of need. All these actions made a difference. We will continue to stay connected and increase programming and partnerships to ensure that we maintain good physical and mental health.

Like you, I eagerly await the day when a vaccine against the novel coronavirus is released and we begin to return to normal. But our world has changed. This strange time has forced us to think about what really matters in life. At a city administration level, the disruptions will lead to changes in the way we work and meet, and what programs and services we offer.

I want to thank the city staff. Like you, these are people with mothers and fathers, sons and daughters, with the same fears as everyone else. These are people who like many of you had to balance their duties as parents when the schools were closed, with their responsibilities to find creative ways to help the public. They rose to the occasion.

Finally, I want to thank my fellow members of City Council. We meet more frequently than ever before thanks to videoconferencing tools, to make decisions about city operations. We adopted legislation for an early state-of-emergency and were the first city in Canada to require mandatory indoor masks in municipal and commercial buildings.

Thank you to everyone who rose to the challenge in 2020. I hope and pray for a sweet and healthy 2021.

District 8 update

Given that the City Côte Saint-Luc is in the COVID-19 red zone and in compliance with health and safety directives, the City will not hold a by-election to fill the office of Councillor for District 8, following the passing of Councillor Ruth Kovac. Côte Saint-Luc is in a similar situation as other municipalities in Quebec that have not had to fill a vacancy since Council has a quorum and has no vacancy in the office of Mayor.

Council is however concerned and aware that the residents of District 8 have the right and expect to be adequately represented. Therefore, in order to ensure that the residents of District 8 have full service and representation, Mayor Mitchell Brownstein will be the direct link with the residents of District 8 in order to maintain the usual follow-ups with these residents. Support local merchants



Rebate for water filters and reverse-osmosis under-sink system

Starting January 2021, the City of Côte Saint-Luc will provide a one-time rebate of up to \$200 towards the purchase and installation of an under-sink water filtration system. The \$200 one-time rebate on under-sink water filtration systems is also offered for systems installed in 2020.

A \$50 rebate is also available towards the purchase of water filters, to every single-family home and duplex built prior to 1976, which are the areas in which the city believes there are water service lines made of lead. The \$50 filter rebate (for under-sink, pitcher-style or faucet filters) for 2021 can be claimed even for homes that previously received it in 2020.

The City encourages residents eligible for the rebate to take advantage of it. The City will be continuing pneumatic excavations in 2021 to identify homes with water service lines made of lead, which is a step in the long-term replacement program. Until this infrastructure is replaced, countertop pitchers with water filters and water filtration systems provide the easiest way to mitigate the risks association with lead.

Long-term overnight parking permit

For security reasons, the City of Côte Saint-Luc prohibits overnight parking between 3 am and 6 am on city streets or city parking lots. However, the city makes exceptions for residents who have no other available parking space. For instance, some residents live in apartment buildings or condos where there are not enough parking spaces to rent. Others live in houses without enough garage or driveway space for everyone in the family. The Long-Term Overnight Parking Permit program is designed to provide these residents with a parking space for their non-commercial vehicle.



Parking

Parking rules are set by Côte Saint-Luc bylaws and the Quebec Highway Safety Code. To avoid a fine, please read parking signs carefully before parking your vehicle. Here are some examples where you cannot park a vehicle:

- Within 5 meters of the corner or a fire hydrant
- On any street overnight between 3am and 6am
- Where signs prohibit you from parking at all times
- Where temporary signs prohibit you to do so for operations such as street cleaning or snow removal
- ► In an emergency lane
- ► In a handicap zone when unauthorized to do so

Move over law

When an emergency vehicle, a tow truck or a surveillance vehicle is stopped by the side of the road and its yellow arrow light signal, rotating lights or flashing lights are activated, you must slow down and move over to leave as much space as possible between you and the stopped vehicle, but only once you have made sure you can do so safely.

If you fail to comply with the Move-Over Law, or do not yield the right of way to an emergency vehicle, you are liable to a fine of \$200 to \$300 and 4 demerit points.

The Move-Over Law applies everywhere—on highways, country roads and city streets. It applies whenever an emergency vehicle, tow truck or surveillance vehicle is stopped and its yellow arrow light signal, flashing lights or rotating lights are activated. Vehicles for which you are required to move over include:

- police vehicles
- ambulances
- fire department vehicles
- Contrôle routier Québec vehicles

- tow trucks
- surveillance vehicles equipped with a yellow arrow
- wildlife protection vehicles

How we clear snow

During and after every snowfall, the City of Côte Saint-Luc plows, salts, and clears 65 km of roads and 122 km of sidewalks. Snow removal operations by the City such as salting, plowing and removal are conducted around the clock. Major snow-removal operations normally take up to 5 days to complete and occur primarily between 6 am and 6 pm.

The snow plowing operation initially involves moving the snow to the curb to allow traffic to flow safely. The snow plowing operation inevitably causes snow to accumulate in front of driveways. The city will follow up by removing these snow banks during the subsequent snow-removal operation. However, the city is not responsible for keeping access to everyone's driveway clear before the scheduled snow-removal operation happens. Residents who want access in the meantime are responsible for clearing the edge of their driveways.

The city's procedure is to clear at least one of the two sidewalks on each street soon after a snowfall. Sometimes private contractors push snow from driveways onto clean sidewalks making them impassable. Other times, continuing snowfall covers up the sidewalks the city cleaned earlier or blowing snow covers up part of the clean sidewalk. As a result, it may look like the city didn't clear one of the sidewalks when, in fact, it already has. We urge residents to speak to their contractors to remind them that pushing snow onto the sidewalk (or street) violates Côte Saint-Luc by-laws. We also ask that residents do their part by pushing snow onto their lawns and not onto sidewalks (and streets). The city will do its part by cleaning the sidewalks (and streets) in a timely manner.



Curbside collection

We collect waste each week on the following schedule:



New waste bins coming in 2021

The City will be delivering new garbage bins to all single-family homes and duplexes in 2021. These black bins will have a lid, which will help stop wildlife from tearing open garbage bags left at the curb. The collector trucks will use a mechanical arm to lift the new black bins and empty the contents. This will improve the efficiency of the collection.

The City will be offering single-family homes and duplexes a default size, but with the option to upgrade to a larger size. We will share more information about the new waste bins in 2021.

Special pick-ups and drop-offs

Some items cannot be placed in blue bins, brown bins, regular waste or bulky waste. This includes mostly large electric devices like refrigerators, air conditioners, water coolers, dehumidifiers, televisions, vacuums and so on.

For items small enough to fit in your trunk, residents must bring them to the Public Works Yard, and drop it off at the e-waste bin. You can also drop it off at the Écocentre Côte-des-Neiges (6928 Côte-des-Neiges Rd.). Please call 514-872-0384 to inquire about opening hours.

For items too large to transport yourself, the city will pick up these items at the curb by appointment on any day of the week. Call Public Works to arrange a pick-up time at 514-485-6868.



Code Red robocall service


Each year, our robocall provider updates our database to include the latest home phone numbers that are publicly available for all addresses in Côte Saint-Luc. Some people don't have Bell home phone lines or perhaps have unlisted numbers. In these cases, we recommend that you add your home phone number to our call out list. If we already have your home phone number in our database and you add it again, you won't be called twice. To add your home phone number, visit **CoteSaintLuc.org/alert**. You can also add your mobile phone number or work phone number. By the way, if you have adult children living anywhere in North America, they can sign up to receive alerts associated with your address, too.

How to protect yourself from scams

To protect yourself from scams:

NEVER give an unsolicited caller access to your computer. If you receive an unexpected phone call about your computer system's security status or performance, and the caller requests remote access to your computer, hang up—even if the caller claims to represent a well-known company or product.

Don't give out personal information. Do not give out credit card or online account details over the phone, unless you made the call and the number you are calling came from a trusted source.

Protect your computer. Make sure your computer is protected with regularly updated anti-virus and anti-spyware software, and a good firewall. But research first, and only purchase software from a source you know and trust.
