Mayor's message



On September 6, 2018, a natural gas leak at the corner of Mackle Rd. and Cavendish Blvd. tested our city administration, first responders, and public utilities. Due to the diligence of the public utilities—Énergir and Hydro-Québec—there was no explosion and no one was injured or worse.

But the incident—at our busiest intersection and in the middle of the morning rush hour — caused ripple effects as traffic increased on Westminster Ave. southbound, and slowed down vehicles trying to get into Côte Saint-Luc. The other effect of the gas leak was that Hydro-Québec was forced to shut off power across most of Côte Saint-Luc as a safety precaution.

By mid afternoon, we were able to re-open the area to traffic and power began to be restored to residents. From early morning until late afternoon, I met with senior staff to stay on top of the situation and ensure residents were properly informed of all developments. At the end of the day we reviewed what went well and where we could improve.

For instance, we realized that many motorists didn't realize they could exit the city using Cavendish Blvd. southbound via Heywood Ave. and instead drove all the way to Westminster. While we posted a dozen updates throughout the day at CoteSaintLuc.org and Facebook and sent two telephone call outs, a few more posts earlier on and an early morning telephone call out might have helped direct some motorists in the right direction.

While we assess how we did, residents need to assess how they did, too. Would you be ready in a real emergency to grab a bag with the basics for you and your family? If you had to stay in place at your home for 72 hours, would you have what you need, such as bottled water, non-perishable foods, medicine, and so on? Visit **www.getprepared.gc.ca** for more information on how to get ready.

We also learned that many people didn't know the city has a telephone and SMS call out service. See page 12 to learn how to get on the call list if you are not already.

Hopefully, we won't have to deal with another situation like the one of September 6 any-time soon. But if we do, we'll be ready and we're counting on residents to be ready, too.

In other news, Côte Saint-Luc is a finalist for Government of Canada Smart Cities Challenge. We've received \$250,000 to build our final proposal. If we win, we will receive \$10 million to implement it. We held a public consultation on November 25 to get feedback on our approach, which focuses on using technology in the home to help isolated seniors live independently, but with the help of a caring community bringing them the best quality of life and happiness. For instance, tools are becoming available to send alerts if a senior falls in his or her home or leaves the stove on. Where the alerts are sent would depend on the situation and could include contacting adult children in town, neighbours, or even the city itself. This is a new initiative and our team is still working out how all the parts will fit together. We are working with a leading Canadian privacy expert to ensure privacy is built into it. You'll be able to read our final proposal right after we submit it in March 2019.

I wish and you and your family a happy and healthy fall and winter.

Long-term overnight parking permit

For security reasons, the City of Côte Saint-Luc prohibits overnight parking between 3 am and 6 am on city streets or city parking lots. However, the city makes exceptions for residents who have no other available parking space. For instance, some residents live in apartment buildings or condos where there are not enough parking spaces to rent. Others live in houses without enough garage or driveway space for everyone in the family. The Long-Term Overnight Parking Permit program is designed to provide these residents with a parking space for their non-commercial vehicle.

Temporary car shelters

New rules came into effect on November 1, 2018 in Côte Saint-Luc on temporary car shelters, or tempos. Some areas of the city are allowed to install tempos, but some are not. Before installing a tempo, please visit **CoteSaintLuc.org/tempos** to check if your street is eligible to do so, or email urbanplanning@cotesaintluc.org. If you are eligible to install a tempo, the next step is to complete the application form and pay the annual fee of \$75 at City Hall. The form is available at **CoteSaintLuc.org/tempos** or at City Hall (5801 Cavendish Blvd.).

Temporary car shelters can be set up from November 1. Car shelters are allowed until April 15 of the following year. The tempo must be translucent white canvas with clear window of at least 0.56m² (6 sq. ft.). This window must be less than 1.83m (6 ft.) from the opening of the tempo. The tempo must be fitted with a dismantable tubular metallic frame.

It must be located at a minimum distance of:

- ▶ 1.98m (6 ft. 6 in.) from a fire hydrant
- ▶ 0.99m (3 ft. 3 in.) from the rear edge of the city sidewalk
- ▶ 1.52m (5 ft.) from the city roadway pavement where no sidewalk exists
- ▶ 4.88m (16 ft.) from the curve of the roadway at an intersection

It is the owner's responsibility to make sure the installation is in keeping with the standards stipulated in Bylaw 2217-57. If the installation does not comply with city bylaws, the city could force the owner to make the necessary adjustments, subject to the fines provided for in the bylaw.

If you live in a single-family home with no garage and already have a tempo permit, then you do not need to apply for a new one. The city will be consulting with residents who live in an area where tempos are not allowed to explore how residents feel about it and whether to update the bylaw to include those areas next year.

Parking

Parking rules are set by Côte Saint-Luc bylaws and the Quebec Highway Safety Code. To avoid a fine, please read parking signs carefully before parking your vehicle. Here are some examples where you cannot park a vehicle:

- ➤ Within 5 meters of the corner or a fire hydrant
- ➤ On any street overnight between 3am and 6am
- Where signs prohibit you from parking at all times
- Where temporary signs prohibit you to do so for operations such as street cleaning or snow removal
- ► In an emergency lane
- ▶ In a handicap zone when unauthorized to do so

New and ongoing projects



Smart Cities Challenge

Côte Saint-Luc was selected as one of 10 finalists in its category (and one of 20 overall) in the Smart Cities Challenge contest organized by Infrastructure Canada.

Our vision, called the SHARED (Senior Health and Real-time Environmental Data) Initiative, would help older adults live more vital, connected lives in their own homes while maintaining their independence. Many people have experienced a time when a senior family member gets sick or takes a fall. Oftentimes, following an incident, the family member's health will deteriorate and we find ourselves asking what we could have done to have prevented the incident. With your help, we can reduce the risk of unnecessary injury and empower all residents of Côte Saint-Luc. Our concept involves using technology to create a safety net and trigger responses, connecting older adults to city services and to their fellow residents. As the level of government closest to you, we are in a unique position to have a real impact on your daily lives.

Each finalist community will receive a \$250,000 grant to help develop its final proposal that outline all design, planning, privacy, data protection and project management components of their plans. The goal of the Smart Cities Challenge is to empower communities across the country to address local issues their residents face through new partnerships, using a smart cities approach.

Parkhaven Pool renovation

The Parkhaven Pool is being renovated over the fall and winter and will be ready to re-open in late June 2019. The pool surface is being rehabilitated and a new ramp for wheelchair access is being created. In addition, there will be a complete reconstruction of a larger wading pool (138 square meters instead of 77 square meters) with a gradual beach-type entrance, and heated water, new water games, four new shade structures near the wading pool, two new shade structures near the main pool, eight renovated outdoor showers, the replacement of exterior lighting and the replacement of the filtration systems. The plans were produced by GBi Services d'ingenierie and the work is being done by Ciment Projeté et Piscines Orléans Inc. The cost of the project is \$1,786,074.

Arena is closing down for a

Waste management



Curbside collection

We collect waste each week on the following schedule:



Some items cannot be placed in blue bins, brown bins, regular waste or bulky waste. This includes mostly large electric devices like refrigerators, air conditioners, water coolers, dehumidifiers, televisions, vacuums and so on.


For items small enough to fit in your trunk, residents must bring them to the Public Works Yard, and drop it off at the e-waste bin. You can also drop it off at the Écocentre Côte-des-Neiges (6928 Côte-des-Neiges Rd.). Please call 514-872-0384 to inquire about opening hours.

For items too large to transport yourself, the city will pick up these items at the curb by appointment on any day of the week. Call Public Works at 514-485-6868 to arrange a pick up time.



How to place your bins

Place your blue bin at the edge of your driveway (but not on the street or sidewalk) with the logo facing the street and the wheels facing the home—just like your brown bin. Leave at least 2 feet (0.6 meters) on either side of the blue bin, which is needed for the mechanical arm to safely lift your blue bin. Make sure nothing else on your driveway is in the way. Finally, ensure that nothing is covering the lid.





Improving transit options

The summer of 2018 marked the start of a series of roundtable discussions among elected officials and staff on the Décarie corridor. The problem to be solved is simple: how are we going to improve the mobility of our residents and help get them to where they want to go?

Getting out of our neighbourhoods along the Décarie corridor means getting past one of the most congested corridors in the country. We are looking to move people faster, and smarter by all modes of transport including:

- 1 smart technologies and apps to power car sharing
- 2 car pooling and shuttles
- 3 more direct and efficient access to metro stations
- 4 access to commuter trains
- 5 access to the 67 kilometre rapid transit system (Réseau express métropolitain, or REM) through the metro's orange line.

Direct bus line to Carrefour Angrignon

The 262 bus, dubbed the *Navette Or Côte Saint-Luc* is a 26 km minibus route designed for seniors. There are 18 stops in each direction, serving seven residences for seniors in that area, as well as the main local points of interest to them.

The minibus route goes to Carrefour Angrignon, with stops along the way at Quartier Cavendish, Maimonides Geriatric Centre, CLSC René-Cassin, the Côte Saint-Luc Public Library, the Côte Saint-Luc Shopping Centre, and the Parkhaven Pool.

The 262 bus operates on Tuesdays, Wednesdays and Thursdays, with four departures in each direction, between 9am and 4pm. For more information, visit **CoteSaintLuc.org/goldshuttle262**.

People aged 65 and older can apply for a reduced fare card by mail. You don't need to visit a faraway metro station. Print the form available at **bit.ly/STMSeniors**, complete it, and include the following documents:

- ▶ A recently-taken, full face picture, printed on photo paper—2 x 2 or 1 x 1 ¼ format
- A photocopy of any one of these photo ID cards: Drivers' licence, healthcare card or passport
- ➤ Your \$15 payment in the form of a personal cheque made to the Société de transport de Montréal, money order, bank draft (no cash accepted)

Home maintenance Backflow prevention valve

A backflow prevention valve is installed on the private side of the service line leading to the sewer. This device is designed to prevent basement flooding in the event of a sewer backup. Here's how to make sure the valve is in proper working order: Check regularly that the valve is not stuck in an open or halfopen position due to blockage or malfunction. In case of heavy rain, avoid flushing the toilet or running the water. Too much water can open the valve, causing the sewer to back up into your home.
